

Health Advice (current at time of printing)

If you have returned from mainland **China** or **Iran** you should isolate yourself for 14 days after leaving mainland China or Iran. If you have travelled from the **Republic of Korea**, on or after 5 March, you must isolate yourself for 14 days from the time you left the Republic of Korea. If you have left or transited through **Italy** on or after 11 March you must isolate yourself for 14 days from the time you left Italy. If you have recently travelled to these countries (**Cambodia**, **Hong Kong, Indonesia, Japan, Singapore or Thailand**) monitor your health for 14 days after leaving that country. If you develop a fever or cough, seek medical advice urgently and isolate yourself. If these last six countries listed apply to you we would suggest you maintain a 2 metre distance from others and do not participate in the peace or holy communion. (please see note inside the pew sheet for additional advice regarding the peace and communion)

Reflection

The Samaritan woman in John 4:5-26, was an outcast. Water would normally have been fetched in the morning or the evening. She was going to the well in the middle of the day when she would be least likely to encounter anyone. This stigma may we have been grossly unfair by our standards, but that was her situation at the time. In that culture, and in these circumstances, Jesus should not have been talking alone with any woman, let alone this particular woman. When the disciples return to find Jesus talking to her they are astonished, but the woman herself is transformed by the encounter and we hear in v.39 that "Many Samaritans"



believed in Jesus because of her testimony." She moves from being an outcast to an evangelist. She came to the well expecting normal water, but instead received transforming living water and a welcome into God's kingdom.

HYGIENE AND HOLY COMMUNION

Thank you for all those who provided feedback to our preliminary communion protocols last week. Things have progressed further this week and so we again modify our practice. We do this bearing in mind the powerful symbolism and the two thousand year history of Christian practices surrounding the greeting of peace and Holy Communion.

Greeting of Peace: Some parishioners do not want to participate in this through shaking hands whilst others still do. Please be respectful of others wishes. If you go to share the peace and you are both extending your hands then you are giving each other permission to share the peace through a handshake. However if one person is not extending their hands or has their hands clasped. Then please respect this and exchange the greeting verbally with a smile. Please be sensitive that some people have medical histories that mean they want to be extra careful in protecting themselves.

Holy Communion.

We continue to provide Holy Communion in both kinds (bread and wine) in accordance with long held Anglican Theology. We take further steps to limit handling of the communion elements. Priest and lay assistants will sanitise their hands before distributing communion. Then all wafers will be intincted with a touch of wine at the altar. Therefore those who only want to receive the bread or who previously intincted (dipped) will have their needs met. The common cup will still be offered for those who wish to receive that. This process will be easier to implement at the small services so please be patient at 10am as we accommodate larger numbers.
