## Reflection

Nicodemus is really keen to understand Jesus, but he is caught up in the limitations of his own thinking, his own literalism. So much of our faith language is powerfully symbolic and beautifully poetic and to try and reduce it to basic literalism as Nicodemus does robs it of its power. Nicodemus is trying to literally understand how a grown person can go through physical birth again. Its impossible! Jesus is speaking of a rebirth of the spirit, being born again in God, being born into God's kingdom.



Symbolic language is an ever-present feature of our faith. Take Holy Communion for example. It is one of the most powerful symbols of the Christian community. The power of communion does not lie in the physical nature of bread and wine, nor does it lie in the precise formula of words that accompany it. The power lies in the mystery that in this symbolic action we are joined with Christians around the world and through the centuries in remembering Christ and being drawn into his presence who is always the host of this eternal meal. No explanation of it ever does it justice for there is always an element of mystery, something beyond our mere definitions. But the underlying reassurance running through our faith story is God's love and salvation for as John 3:16 says: "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life."

Annual Parishioner nominations are needed for parish council, people's warden, and parish Nomination Committee.

#### HYGIENE AND HOLY COMMUNION

Parishioners may be aware of some Roman Catholic Dioceses are refraining from offering the wine during communion due to fears regarding the Coronavirus. We have no such plans at this stage but a few important points should be noted.

- within Christian theology it is considered that taking either the bread or the wine on its own is still considered full communion.
   Some people choose only to receive the bread and that is fine and their choice.
- Despite point (1) it is an Anglican article of religion that communion should always be offered to people in both kinds (ie both bread and wine)
- 3) Christians have shared communion and the common cup for two thousand years and it is a very powerful symbol. To do this safely we are always advised to use fortified wine with a suitably high alcohol content and impervious communion vessels like Silver.
- 4) The practice of intinction (dipping the wafer in the wine) is by far the <u>least</u> hygienic way to share communion. Hands carry much more bacteria than lips. Previous advice has suggested a separate intincting chalice for this purpose. This does not necessarily solve the issue.

### **Preliminary Protocols**

From now on clergy and lay assistants will sanitise their hands prior to communion. The practice of parishioners intincting (dipping) their own wafer will cease. If you wish to intinct please pass the wafer back to the lay assistant and they will dip it for you and return it to you. If you wish to receive the common cup then take communion as usual. If you choose to only receive the bread that is fine too but both bread and wine will continue to be made available.

We will keep you advised of any further advice that we need to follow.
