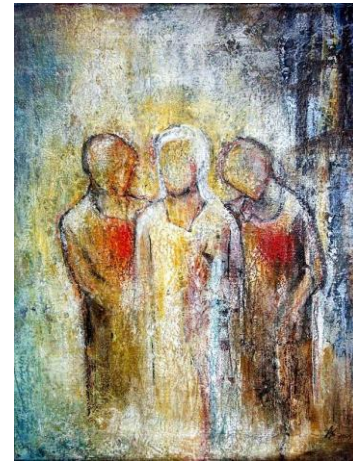

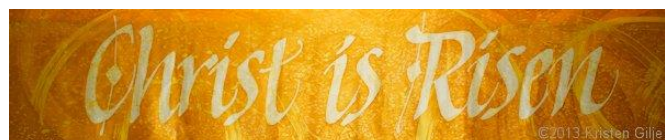

## First Reading

**Acts 2:14a,36-41**

### A reading from the book of Acts

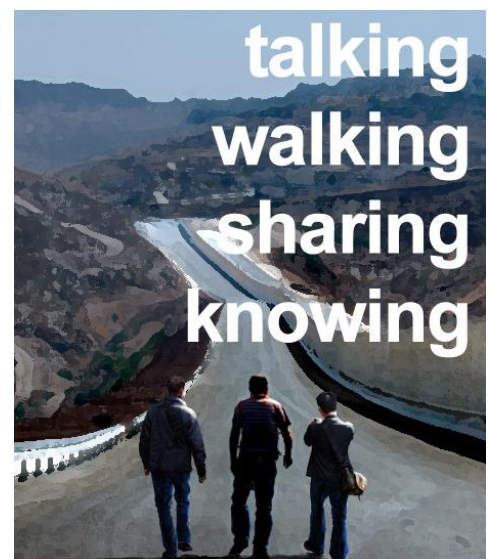
On the day of Pentecost, Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed the crowd, let the entire house of Israel know with certainty that God has made him both Lord and Messiah, this Jesus whom you crucified.' Now when they heard this, they were cut to the heart and said to Peter and to the other apostles, 'Brothers, what should we do?' Peter said to them, 'Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you, for your children, and for all who are far away, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to him.' And he testified with many other arguments and exhorted them, saying, 'Save yourselves from this corrupt generation.' So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added to their number.

**1 Peter 1:17-23**

### **A reading from the first letter of Peter**

If you invoke as Father the one who judges all people impartially according to their deeds, live in reverent fear during the time of your exile. You know that you were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your ancestors, not with perishable things like silver or gold, but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without defect or blemish. He was destined before the foundation of the world, but was revealed at the end of the ages for your sake. Through him you have come to trust in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are set on God.

Now that you have purified your souls by your obedience to the truth so that you have genuine mutual love, love one another deeply from the heart. You have been born anew, not of perishable but of imperishable seed, through the living and enduring word of God. Hear the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

## **Gospel**

**Luke 24:13-35**

**✠ The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke  
Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ**

Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went

with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, 'What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?' They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, 'Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?' He asked them, 'What things?' They replied, 'The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him.' Then he said to them, 'Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?' Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, 'Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over.' So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?' That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. They were saying, 'The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!' Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

### CVS AND AGED CARE FACILITY NEWS FOR ALL PARISHIONERS

Please Note: Once visiting can resume all Aged Care Facilities will require visiting volunteers to provide proof of a current flu vaccination. If you are getting a flu shot make sure you get a printed record of this. CVS are awaiting a grant to help pay for this, so if you require assistance with the cost of the Flu shot (that is the prescription cost not the cost of the visit to a GP) then contact Hewina for reimbursement.

For CVS visitors, keeping in touch with your residents at this time is tricky, so a big thank you for all you are doing. Phone calls and letters are great (speak to Hewina if you need stamps). Sending photos of your garden for example or pictures by your grandchildren would be well received. Some aged facilities like Charles Young and Kapara have Tablets or iPads available for residents to use - you could have a Facetime or Skype conversation with your resident (check with Hewina if you need more information about these). You will have to book this with the Aged Care Facility. If your CVS friend is in Estia, phone the Front Desk (8128 8888) and ask for Megan.

Hewina would love to hear from anyone prepared to be in phone contact with either Aged Care residents OR individuals in private homes who receive care packages. We are awaiting confirmation that private residents on care packages can now be included in our CVS scheme and this might be a way to grow our CVS ministry during this time. Speak to Hewina in the office to discuss this further.

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## NEGOTIATING FACEBOOK – A FEW HINTS FOR BEGINNERS

Many people are making positive comments about worship services and other Facebook posts. It has also been a good way for people to interact, give feedback and make comments with one another.

If you are not familiar with Facebook it might be helpful to explain it a little more for it can be a bit mind-boggling how quickly things information appears and old posts move down out of view as new posts are continually put up.

If you want to find just the church posts try entering "St Peter's Church Glenelg" in the Facebook search bar. When you do that you will see just our parish posts but you may then be confused as to why they are not in date order. That is because if someone has made a comment on a previous post it comes back up to the top of the pile. So, for example, if someone decides to watch a service from a few weeks ago and likes it and comments on it, it will come back up to the top of the search list and you might mistakenly think it is the most recent service.

All of the posts are dated, and all our worship services are being posted on Sundays, so just look for the correct Sunday date you want and then you should find the service you are looking for.

## ARCHBISHOP GEOFF SMITH ELECTED PRIMATE OF AUSTRALIA

Some of you will have heard the news that Archbishop Geoff Smith has been elected Primate of Australia. This follows the conclusion of the term of Phillip Freier (Archbishop of Melbourne) in that role. I might point out that our Archbishop will not be leaving Adelaide, as some people have asked me. The role of Primate is taken on by a diocesan bishop in the church in addition to their current role. So Geoff will take on that role as senior bishop in the country whilst still being Archbishop of Adelaide. The Diocese will receive some support from the national church for his time undertaking these duties.

A suitable prayer could be...

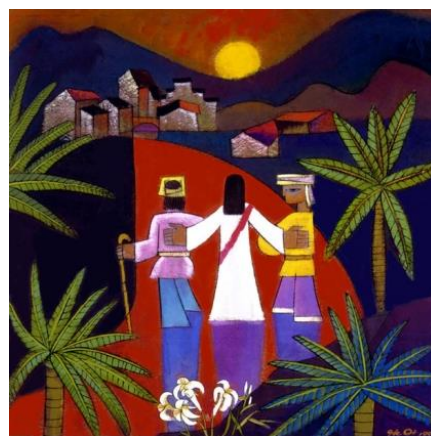
*Almighty and All-loving God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit,
