# How can I Help?

## Priest's Reflection - Rev Andrew

Some of you may be fans of the TV medical drama "New Amsterdam". Apart from the usual soap opera romances, the drama revolves around Dr Max Goodwin, new medical director to the New Amsterdam hospital. People constantly come to Max with questions, dilemmas and problems and he maintains a constant response: "How can I help?" In those four simple

words he exudes a desire to assist the person and pay respect to their part in solving the problem.

The healing of Blind Bartimaeus is one of the most moving encounters Jesus has in the Gospel of Mark. Bartimaeus is marginalised, pushed to the roadside, as the world passes him by. He hears that Jesus is passing and calls out but others tell him to be quiet – to stay in his place. Bartimaeus is persistent, he doesn't give up, he calls to Jesus

with renewed vigour. Jesus asks for Bartimaeus to be brought to him and then says, in so many words: "How can I help?" or, "What do you want me to do for you?" This is an immensely powerful question. Jesus can see the man is blind, he knows what he wants, but he restores the man's dignity by giving him the opportunity to remain in control of naming his need.

Jesus truly sees this man that others have simply walked by or worse, tried to silence. Jesus affirms that it is Bartimaeus' faith that has made him well. He is one of only two people in the whole Gospel of Mark to have their faith affirmed in this way. Bartimaeus is brought from the margins to the centre with the simple question: "How can I help?" Would we have noticed Bartimaeus? Who do we see? And importantly - Who do we not see?

First Reading Job 42.1-8, 10-17

## A reading from the book of Job

Then Job answered the Lord: 'I know that you can do all things, and that no purpose of yours can be thwarted. "Who is this that hides counsel without knowledge?" Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful for me, which I did not know. "Hear, and I will speak; I will question you, and you declare to me." I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you; therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes.'

After the Lord had spoken these words to Job, the Lord said to Eliphaz the Temanite: "My wrath is kindled against you and against your two friends; for you have not spoken of me what is right, as my servant Job has. Now therefore take seven bulls and seven rams, and go to my servant Job, and offer up for yourselves a burnt offering; and my servant Job shall pray for you, for I will accept his prayer not to deal with you according to your folly; for you have not spoken of me what is right, as my servant Job has done."

And the Lord restored the fortunes of Job when he had prayed for his friends; and the Lord gave Job twice as much as he had before. Then there came to him all his brothers and sisters and all who had known him before, and they ate bread with him in his house; they showed him sympathy and comforted him for all the evil that the Lord had brought upon him; and each of them gave him a piece of money and a gold ring.

The Lord blessed the latter days of Job more than his beginning; and he had fourteen thousand sheep, six thousand camels, a thousand yoke of oxen, and

a thousand donkeys. He also had seven sons and three daughters. He named the first Jemimah, the second Keziah, and the third Keren-happuch. In all the land there were no women so beautiful as Job's daughters; and their father gave them an inheritance along with their brothers. After this Job lived for one hundred and forty years, and saw his children, and his children's children, four generations. And Job died, old and full of days.

# Second Reading Hebrews 7.23-28 A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

The former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; but he holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues for ever. Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them.

For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. Unlike the other high priests, he has no need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his

own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect for ever.

## CURRENT COVID RESTRICTIONS — UPDATED 23<sup>RD</sup> SEPTEMBER:

Please follow the current SA Health regulations

- 1. Please check-in by QR code or on the slips of paper when attending.
- 2. Masks must be worn indoors for public events and public areas. This applies to worship. However those doing bible readings, intercessions and preaching may remove them when presenting. (ie parish group gatherings on our premises that are not open to the public do not require masks but do require social distancing.)
- 3. Singing can take place but masks must be worn.
- 4. Please maintain 1.5m social distancing where possible.
- 5. Masks may be removed for receiving communion. Please sanitise your hands prior to receiving and observe social distancing when queuing.
- 6. Masks may be removed for morning tea, (must be seated for over 50% capacity)
- 7. Funeral and Wedding capacities have been increased to 150 people.
