

Priest's Reflection - Rev Andrew

Last week we heard Jesus extol the generosity of the poor widow and criticize the scribes for drawing honour and attention to themselves. This Sunday Jesus goes a step further predicting the whole temple system will come crashing down and then he takes up his position on the Mount of Olives, "opposite the temple".



Jesus' prediction came true in 70AD when the temple was destroyed. Jesus had such a heart for justice, that he knew an unjust system would not survive. The challenge of today's gospel, for the church and any institution, is to constantly examine its systems and structures for abuse, inequality and injustice.

We live in a time when there is little implicit trust in the church, or in many other institutions, by those outside them. We also have more rigorous safety measures than we have ever had before but that on its own is not enough. The church and all Christians must continuously live the path of the widow rather than the scribes (see Mark 12:38-44). There will never be a return to the place of status the church once had but that is not our purpose. Our purpose is faithful prayer and humble service. This has always been the case as shown in the prayer of former Archbishop of Canterbury, William Laud (1573-1645)

Most gracious Father,
we pray to you for your holy Church.
Fill it with all truth;
and in all truth with all peace.
Where it is corrupt, purge it.
Where it is in error, direct it.
Where it is superstitious, rectify it.
Where anything is amiss, reform it.
Where it is right, strengthen and defend it.
Where it is in want, provide for it.
Where it is divided and torn apart,
heal it and reunite it O holy One;
for the sake of Jesus Christ
our Lord and Saviour. Amen.

First Reading 1 Samuel 1:9-20

A Reading from the first book of Samuel

After they had eaten and drunk at Shiloh, Hannah rose and presented herself before the Lord. Now Eli the priest was sitting on the seat beside the doorpost of the temple of the Lord. She was deeply distressed and prayed to the Lord, and wept bitterly. She made this vow: 'O Lord of hosts, if only you



will look on the misery of your servant, and remember me, and not forget your servant, but will give to your servant a male child, then I will set him before you as a nazirite until the day of his death. He shall drink neither wine nor intoxicants, and no razor shall touch his head.'

As she continued praying before the Lord, Eli observed her mouth. Hannah was praying silently; only her lips moved, but her voice was not heard; therefore Eli thought she was drunk. So Eli said to her, 'How long will you make a drunken spectacle of yourself? Put away your wine.' But Hannah answered, 'No, my lord, I am a woman deeply troubled; I have drunk neither wine nor strong drink, but I have been pouring out my soul before the Lord. Do not regard your servant as a worthless woman, for I have been speaking

out of my great anxiety and vexation all this time.' Then Eli answered, 'Go in peace; the God of Israel grant the petition you have made to him.' And she said, 'Let your servant find favour in your sight.' Then the woman went to her quarters, ate and drank with her husband, and her countenance was sad no longer.

They rose early in the morning and worshipped before the Lord; then they went back to their house at Ramah. Elkanah knew his wife Hannah, and the Lord remembered her. In due time Hannah conceived and bore a son. She named him Samuel, for she said, 'I have asked him of the Lord.'

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Second Reading

Hebrews 10:11-14, 19-25 A reading from the book of Hebrews

Every priest stands day after day at his service, offering again and again the same sacrifices that can never take away sins. But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, 'he sat down at the right hand of God', and since then has been waiting 'until his enemies would be made a footstool for his feet.' For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are sanctified.

CURRENT COVID RESTRICTIONS — UPDATED 23RD SEPTEMBER FROM SA HEALTH:

- 1. Please check-in by QR code or on the slips of paper when attending.

Christmas Fun Fact: Thomas Edison's assistant, Edward Johnson, had the idea of electric lights for Christmas trees in 1882. The first bulb-lit tree stood in Edison's power plant, Manhattan, set on a rotating box so that passers-by could see all 80-blinking red, white & blue lights. No one had seen anything like it. Electric lights in the early days, as with new inventions, were awfully expensive & needed to be installed by an electrician. Only the rich could afford them & would host lavish parties to show off their Christmas trees adorned with electric lights.
