

WORSHIP THEME: BLESSINGS AND WOES

### Priest's Message

Jesus' *Sermon on the Mount* (Matthew Chapters 5-7) is often regarded as one of the greatest speeches of all time. For many people it is a distillation of the key teachings of Jesus. Nowhere near as much attention is paid to Jesus' *Sermon on the Plain* (Luke 6:17-49).



Why do they have these names? Matthew Chapter 5 begins the sermon with "*When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain...he began to speak and taught them...*". Whereas in Luke's much shorter version it begins: "*He came down with them and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people...*" Both sermons then commence with a list of beatitudes (blessings). Matthew's Gospel has the better known, and much loved, nine beatitudes, whereas Luke's gospel has four blessings and four matching woes. Whilst both versions sit easily within Jesus' broader teachings, Luke's is particularly confronting in the juxtaposition of blessings and woes that it presents. Those who are blessed are poor, hungry, weeping and hated whereas those who suffer woes are the rich, the well-fed, the laughing and those well-spoken of. What are we to make of this and how do we 'sell' this message to a society that strives to be wealthy, well-fed, happy and respected? Surely these woes are not bad things!

Cast your mind back to Luke 4:18-19 where Jesus outlined his manifesto for ministry – good news for the poor, release to captives, sight to the blind and freedom for the oppressed. And cast your minds further back to Mary's Magnificat: "he has filled the hungry with good things and sent the rich away empty." The blessings and woes in Luke, whilst confronting, continue this great Gospel image of equalisation. Jesus proclaims a kingdom that is not about success and winning over others. It is about radical equality – equality in status, love and blessing. It has been said that Jesus came to comfort the disturbed and disturb the comfortable. Here we see this starkly and it stops the beatitudes just being a nice sentiment to those who are lacking but is also a wake up call to those who have the resources to help them.

**It does not fear** when heat comes; its leaves are always green. **It has no worries** in a year of drought and never fails to bear fruit.



If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified of God that he raised Christ—whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised. If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have died in Christ have perished. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died.

## NATIONAL CHURCH LIFE SURVEY

## CURRENT COVID RESTRICTIONS

Checking in using QR code or paper is still required. Masks must be worn at all times except if you have a current medical condition which precludes it. Masks may be removed momentarily when taking communion. Masks must be worn for singing. Readers, preachers etc may remove their masks for communication purposes. We should maintain physical distancing where possible.
