### **Priest's Message**

The story of Mary anointing Jesus' feet with her hair is always one that prompts an emotional reaction from us, just as it did from those who witnessed the act.

Those of us doing the Luke-Acts reading plan for Lent will feel this story is familiar,



but not quite. That is because this event is told differently in Luke 7:36-50 with Jesus being in the house of Simon the pharisee and the woman is unnamed. In Luke, there is no debate about the cost of the ointment and the wastefulness of the gift, just the shock about her public display which is followed by Jesus affirming her hospitality towards him compared to the lack of hospitality provided by Simon.

Here in John's Gospel the action is far more homely. Jesus is in a familiar setting with his dear friends, Mary, Martha and Lazarus. The action of Mary is strikingly intimate but less shocking given their close friendship. The emphasis is much more on the symbolic nature of her act - Jesus is being anointed for burial. He is all too aware that his sacrifice on the cross is looming and this must surely weigh heavily on him. In this context, Mary's gift to Jesus is one of kindness, tenderness and service. I always wonder if her generous action inspired Jesus to wash his disciples' feet at the Last Supper as we recall on Maundy Thursday (John 13:1-20.)

This event is also narrated in Mark 14:3-9 in the house of Simon the Leper. The action there is similar to John, although it is the people present who protest about the wastefulness of the ointment rather than Judas. Mark presciently recounts Jesus saying: "Truly I tell you, wherever the good news is proclaimed in the whole world, what she has done will be told in remembrance of her." (14:9). And all these centuries later we still are.

# Second Reading Philippians 3.4b-14 A reading from the letter of Paul to the Philippians


If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith.

I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead. Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own.

Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume.



But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, 'Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?' (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.)

Jesus said, 'Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me.'

For the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.
