Priest's Message

Peter's denial of Jesus in the courtyard of the High Priest was understandable given how scared Peter must have felt. Jesus had been arrested, his fate was uncertain. Peter would have feared for his life also. The accusation by others that he was one of Jesus' followers, if answered in the affirmative, could have led to his arrest too. But as understandable as his three denials were, they surely weighed heavily on him after Jesus' death.



What did life hold for Peter now? Yes, he had experienced the presence of the risen Jesus in the locked room and he had breathed on them the gift of the Holy Spirit (John 20:19-23), but that experience alone doesn't seem to have given Peter a new direction. So he has returned to what he knows best – fishing. Yet even this offers no consolation as they catch nothing. The risen Jesus calls them to cast the net on the other side which they do and the nets are filled to overflowing. In this experience not only does Peter recognise the risen Lord but it symbolically shows the life he is to lead now. However there is a barrier that must first be overcome.

The risen Jesus makes no reference to Peter's three denials and yet in the most beautiful of interactions he gives Peter three opportunities to profess his love and loyalty. Thus this gift of forgiveness liberates Peter to take on the ministry role that Jesus is calling him to. From this point on Peter's role is to feed the lambs entrusted to him, the followers of Jesus, the fledgeling church. Peter is forgiven, freed and empowered to minister to Christ's flock. And so too are each of us.



Gospel John 21:1-19

★ The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. Simon Peter said to them, 'I am going fishing.' They said to him, 'We will go with you.' They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.



Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, 'Children, you have no fish, have you?' They answered him, 'No.' He said to them, 'Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some.' So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord!' When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the lake. But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off.

When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. Jesus said to them, 'Bring some of the fish that you have just caught.' So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred and fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, 'Who are you?' because they knew it was the Lord. Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.'

A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Tend my sheep.' He said to him the third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, 'Do you love me?' And he said to him, 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep.

Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go.' (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, 'Follow me.'

UPDATED EASING OF COVID RESTRICTIONS

Checking in – no longer required to Check-in for services and events.

Masks - We are <u>no longer mandated</u> to wear masks although if you choose to wear them in worship or other crowded settings that is perfectly acceptable as well.

Hospitality – all restrictions removed as long as good infection control is in place.

Singing – <u>all restrictions eased</u>.

Physical distancing – no requirement in churches although it remains recommended where possible.

COVID-safe plans – We are still required to have a COVID safe plan. Current plans continue to be displayed at the entrances of both churches.

COVID Marshals –COVID marshals are no longer required except in certain settings and for events requiring a COVID management plan (over 1000 people attending). Thus these roles are no longer needed for our usual operations.

Communion – We are awaiting further advice and continue as is for the time being. **Baptisms** – continue as is with no shared water for multiple baptisms.

It's always great to welcome visitors to our churches at St Peter's, Glenelg and St Martin's, Glenelg South.

At **7:45am** (St Peter's) you will need this news sheet and a green prayerbook (p.119). At **8:45am** (St Martin's) you will be greeted with a news sheet, prayer & hymnbooks to use. At **10am** (St Peter's) you only need this news sheet as the service is on the powerpoint screen.



Feel free to sit anywhere - there are no specially reserved seats.

Toilets are located, at St Peter's, along the passageway, under the projector screen. At St Martin's, they are in the corridor adjacent to the worship space.

Feel free to join in with all aspects of worship as you feel comfortable. Please be aware that visitors are warmly welcome to receive communion with us.

We love to meet new people so you are very welcome to stay for a cuppa after the service, but don't feel bad if you need to get away - there's always next time.

We hope you find inspiration and blessing in your time spent here.
