

Priest's Message

A number of years ago the Church of England launched a controversial advertising campaign which you can see to the right. It was intended to get people thinking about their image of Jesus and to counter the idea that Jesus was somehow an insipid character just saying we should be nice to each other. The image used is purposely provocative and borrows from revolutionary imagery. It is true that Jesus spoke a lot about love but the "Gospel love" he preached and lived is a love that is courageous and strong – speaking out against injustice,



including those on the margins, and fearlessly defying the authorities. If this image makes us a little uncomfortable then we are not alone as many of Jesus' listeners also felt uncomfortable.

The words in today's gospel are uncomfortable words. Jesus proclaims that he has come to bring fire and division! Wait a minute! What is going on here? What happened to gentle Jesus meek and mild? For context I recommend reading through the Gospel of Luke Chapters 11-14. Jesus is strong and stirring throughout this section of Luke. He calls people hypocrites, he calls King Herod a fox (in a direct message to him) and he has a number of woes for various people. This is tough stuff indeed. This gospel passage (and others like it) stops us from thinking the gospel is too cosy and comfortable. We are challenged and stirred into seeing that it is not always easy - there is sometimes a price to pay. Whilst the biggest opposition to being a Christian in this country may only be apathy or disparagement, in many other countries, Christianity is a far riskier and costlier path to take. Imagine how those Christians read these words and relate to them first-hand.

Yet, even in the midst of challenges to faith, challenges to fairness, justice, goodness and peace, we are encouraged to run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking always to Jesus, who endured the cross and gives us eternal life.


Sentence

First Reading Isaiah 5:1-7

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

Let me sing for my beloved my love-song concerning his vineyard: My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill. He dug it and cleared it of stones, and planted it with choice vines; he built a watch-tower in the midst of it, and hewed out a wine vat in it; he expected it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes.

And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard. What more was there to do for my vineyard that I have not done in it? When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes?

And now I will tell you what I will do to my vineyard. I will remove its hedge, and it shall be devoured; I will break down its wall, and it shall be trampled down. I will make it a waste; it shall not be pruned or hoed, and it shall be overgrown with briers and thorns; I will also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it.

For the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are his pleasant planting; he expected justice, but saw bloodshed; righteousness, but heard a cry!

Second Reading

Hebrews 11:29-32; 39-12:2 A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land, but when the Egyptians attempted to do so they were drowned. By faith the walls of Jericho fell after they had been encircled for seven days. By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had received the spies in peace.

And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets -Yet all these, though they were commended for their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had provided something better so that they would not, without us, be made perfect.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run

with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

★ The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ
